Still in search of summer fun for little ones? Hill-Stead Museum in Farmington is hosting "Summer Nature & Arts Adventure" for children entering grades 1 to 6. The camp will combine art, culture, history and nature, utilizing the museum's art collection and the grounds of the estate to inspire children. The camp, which begins July 13 for three weekly sessions, will be Mondays through Fridays from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daily. Each week of the multi-disciplinary camp has a different theme. The

days are structured around three one-hour activities, both nature- and art-oriented. Participants will enjoy time in the museum, exploring the property and trying their hands at studio art. Each week will also feature a guest speaker who specializes in nature, art or animals.

Themes vary from week to week. July 13 to 17 will focus on "On the Farm," with colonial history, early Farmington history, animals and farm life. July 20 to 24 is titled "Canvas & Compass," with lessons in watercolor and pottery as well as opportunities for painting en plein air and time to enjoy nature hikes. From July 27 to 31, the focus is on "Around the World," with talk about world travel, culture, cuisine and climate.

Children are grouped into three sections by grades, with grades 1 and 2 together, grades 3 and 4 combined, and grades 5 and 6 in the final group.
