

Meet your 2010 Mum Parade marshals

When the annual Mum Festival parade steps off and heads through the heart of Bristol on Sunday, Sept. 26, there will be a decidedly country flair to this hometown event.

This year's parade marshals are the morning personalities on Country 92-5 FM, WWYZ—Jim Bosh and Cory Myers.

The Observer caught up with the duo via email to talk about the Mum Festival and life as radio personalities in Connecticut country radio.

Q: What was your reaction when the Mum Festival tapped you as marshals?

Bosh: Surprised and honored to be the marshal once again.

Cory: Do we get a cool badge and gun belt? OH! Not that kind of marshal... sorry.

Q: Why is it something you're looking forward to doing?

Bosh: Because it's always a fun, family event.

Cory: We love to hang out in Bristol where we know there are millions of

Q: What can't you wait for once the parade starts?

Bosh: I love to make funny faces and do voices for the kids.

Cory: He's lying...he can't wait for the end to use the bathroom... Kidding! The energy of the crowd is amazing and we actually get a good arm workout waving.

Q: What do you like about the Mum Festival

and what's your favorite part of the annual event?

Bosh: Marching bands because I used to play second trumpet in the band.

Cory: And believe me there was a good reason he was SECOND trumpet! I love the mums, of course. And I love to meet Miss Mum and Junior Miss Mum...they are always impressive young ladies that I think set a good example.

Q: How did you get

involved in radio and what made you decide that being a disc jockey was a pretty cool career?

Bosh: I only wanted to work five hours a day.

Cory: I couldn't do the 9 to 5 thing...and I never shut up so why not put that to good use? And our families will tell you that we think we think we know everything so why not talk about it all for a living?

Q: What's the best part of hosting the Bosh and Cory show every morning?

Bosh: The fresh, tasty, home-baked hot cross buns that Cory brings in every morning.

Cory: I'm supposed to do that? Is that in my contract? I love meeting our listeners. They are the kindest, most generous, most real people. And when we

ask them to help, whether it's for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital or the Wounded Warrior Project or the MS Society, they are right there with us.

Q: Why do you think you guys make a great team?

Bosh: Heavy medication, no seriously, we are both loud mouth Italians that share the same type of upbringing and background.

Cory: Yeah, what he said.

Q: What's the hardest part of your job?

Bosh and Cory: Waking up before the birds and the rooster! 3:30 a.m. comes really fast...

Q: What was the most interesting thing that hap-

pened to you on your job?

Cory: I think it's been interesting to see the metamorphosis of radio. When I started 20 years ago, radio was using the Cart system, basically what looked like an 8-track tape. Then to CD, then digital and now the integration of the web with social networking sites and streaming.

Bosh: And I started before that when we were actually spinning records.

Q: Whose your favorite country artist and why?

Bosh: That's not fair, how can we say just one? There are so many that are amazing. But I do love Martina McBride for obvious reasons. And her voice is good, too.

Cory: Whew, yeah,

Mum Festival moving closer to golden anniversary

As the countdown to its golden anniversary continues, the Mum Festival is taking this year to celebrate a citywide milestone.

The 49th annual Mum Festival is weeks away. This year the fall festival is commemorating the city's 225th birthday with the theme, "Mum Festival Celebrates 225 years of Bristol."

"I feel, the Mum Festival, being a festival for the Bristol community, this would be a good way to celebrate with the citizens of Bristol," said Darlene Sawe, chairperson of the festival

committee, about incorporating the city's 225th anniversary into the theme of this year's festival.

The festival's first weekend is Friday, Sept. 24 through Sunday, Sept. 26.

The weekend, and the festival, begins with the crowning of Miss Mum and Jr. Miss Mum at Bristol Central High School on Sept. 24, before moving to Memorial Boulevard the next two days.

The festival features two full days of music, games, and family activities on Memorial Boulevard, including a "touch-a-truck" event for children and a

truck and tractor show.

Before the events begin on Memorial Boulevard Sunday, Sept. 26, the annual Mum Parade will weave its way through downtown led by Parade Marshals Jim Bosh and Cory Myers, morning personalities for Country 92.5

In keeping with the focus of celebrating with the community, Sawe said, the committee focused on ways to engage the community in the festival.

"Our goal this year was to get the community involved," said Sawe.

With that in mind, Sawe said the musical acts per-

forming on Sunday, Sept. 26 are mostly local acts.

"We felt it was a good way to get the families involved" said Sawe.

The committee has also embraced local organizations as well.

Sawe said the Bristol Veterans Council is working with the committee to bring a rock-climbing wall the Memorial Boulevard along with several military vehicles.

The second weekend of the festival, Friday, Oct. 3 through Sunday, Oct. 3 is dedicated community organizations.

There is no particular

committee sponsored events for the second weekend. Rather, Sawe said, the weekend is open for local organizations to host events and showcase themselves.

The weekend includes a concert put on by the Salvation Army that will be a fundraiser for the organization. Also, the Bristol Historical Society is hosting a concert in honor of the late Jack Denehy, the founder of the city's Military Museum.

Sawe added that a host of organizations are holding open houses during this weekend, including the Fire Department's annual open

house.

The festival will close with Mum Bingo, Saturday, Oct. 9, and the Mum Festival Road Race, Sunday, Oct. 10.

Sawe said she's hopeful that everyone in Bristol will come out to celebrate during the festival, and bring their families.

"This is going to be an awesome year," Sawe said. "Everyone's excited."

Mum Fest to honor 'Hometown Hero,' Sgt. Matthew Lavoie

For the first time in its long history, the Mum Festival is honoring a "Hometown Hero."

The "Hometown Hero" recognition highlights several new changes that are part of the 49th annual Mum Festival.

The new recognition is a way for the Mum Festival

Committee to honor the actions of city resident during the annual fall festival, said Darlene Sawe, chairperson of the committee.

The committee named

U.S. Army Sgt. Matthew Lavoie as the first ever "Hometown Hero."

"He's just someone I feel Bristol needs to recognize," said Sawe.

Lavoie, a graduate of Bristol Eastern High School, was injured in Iraq by a roadside bomb, Sawe said. For the past year and a half, she said, Lavoie has been receiving treatment at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington D.C. where he has undergone

more than 50 surgeries.

Sawe described Lavoie as a great, young man who is humbled by the award. She felt the community's support would be a great lift for Lavoie's morale.

"I felt that we could make a difference. By doing it, maybe it would lift his spirits. ... He can see that he has our support and he's not alone," said Sawe.

Lavoie will be honored Saturday, Sept. 25 on Memorial Boulevard at 12

p.m. during the festival's first weekend.

As part of the weekend, the American Legion Post 2 will host a meet and greet breakfast with Lavoie beginning at 8 a.m. Sunday, Sept.

26. Lavoie will also lead the Mum Parade.

Applications to nominate people for next year's "Hometown Hero" will be available during the weekend.

Arrest made in murder

A 26-year-old man was arrested in Providence, RI last week and charged with the murder of Jose Cruz-Diaz.

Cruz-Diaz, 22, was shot multiple times and killed in front of his apartment at 81 Locust St., on Aug 15. Thirteen days later, police obtained an arrest warrant for Gliberto Marrero-Alejandro.

On Aug. 28 Bristol police working together with Providence, RI police located Marrero-Alejandro in Providence and took him into custody.

Marrero-Alejandro was charged with murder and was held on a \$5 million bond. Marrero-Alejandro was expected to be extradited to Bristol for arraignment

during the middle of this week.

Police said Marrero-Alejandro had no permanent address, but wasn't from Bristol.

The arrest warrant was sealed, and as of press time no further information was available.
